New additions to the library in 2023, included:

A Library Van - As items move daily between libraries, the van will save money spent in delivery services. Additionally, it will be used in outreach programming. Outreach is a primary value of the library. We meet community members where they are. In 2023, we widened the way we serve our community and boosted how often we interact with those we serve. Purchase of Congress Park building - This administration building will allow for more patron space (funding was provided by the sale of a long-held vacant lot).

Beanstack App - From "Shark Tank" to your library, this app motivates people to read using recognition, gamification principles, and competition to grow a reading culture.

Copier Payment Kiosks - installed at each location to make it simpler for patrons to make copies.

FamilySearch Affiliate Library - Many patrons take advantage of our genealogy databases, and now as a FamilySearch affiliate, we can offer deeper free privileges.

LOTE4 Kids - In an effort to make language learning accessible, and as always - free, we now provide LOTE4Kids, an app with more than 60 languages.

## Celebrating Service

Community-focused libraries can do amazing things.

The Washington-Centerville Public Library demonstrated this by successfully hosting *The Wall* That Heals, a three-auarter scale replica of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C. This event, funded in part by the Centerville-Washington Foundation's Community Impact Grant, showcased the library's strong community partnerships. Thanks to support from throughout the community, the event attracted more than 5,000 visitors over the five-day period.



The Vietnam War created a lasting slogan: "Never again will one generation of veterans abandon another." Some Vietnam veterans had never been officially thanked for their service and were visibly touched by the recognition.


Statement of Activities in Service to the Community

By investing wisely, frugal spending, and fundraising, we have been able to broaden programming, increase services, and plan for an expanded Creativity Commons - the only public library makerspace in Montgomery County - offering a multitude of equipment at the cost to users of just materials.
