Librarians are information technology experts who curate dynamic collections both physical and digital — that are tailored to your needs. They can guide you through extensive digital resources, including eBooks, eAudiobooks, and hundreds of online

resources.

Perhaps the most surprising is the "Library of Things," where you can borrow items like power washers, musical instruments, and cake-decoratina kits alonaside traditional materials, as well as Creativity Commons, our DIY makerspace.

Programming has expanded beyond children's storytimes to include teen lock-ins, adult game nights, technology workshops, financial literacy classes, and genealogy research assistance.

The library has evolved into a dynamic space where resources, technology, and people connect meaningfully — a far cry from the stereotypical hushed reading room of the past.





The Library Maintains Fiscal Discipline Despite Rising






